

Since 1976, the USA Federation Karate through itself and its forerunner AAU/USA Karate has recognized those who have made significant contributions to the Olympic Karate movement. In 1997 other SIGNIFICANT NA-TIONAL MARTIAL ARTS FEDERATIONS decided to have their Hall of Fame inductees honored

along with those of the USAKF. In the past, honorees of the US Ju-Jitsu Federation, the USKA Law Enforcement Division (PSDI), the US Kobudo Federation (World Kobudokan), Global Martial Arts Federations, and the Central Taekwondo World Tae Kwon Do Chang Moo Kwan have participated in the USA Karate Federation Hall of Fame. At this induction, the Police Self-Defense Institute (PSDI) is participating.

It is not easy to get into the Hall of Fame. Having money, having many students, having good PR --- and all those things DO NOT INFLUENCE our Hall of Fame selection committee. Outstanding achievements and dedicated work of an extraordinary level must be seen. DEDICATION, PERSERVERANCE, SINCERITY, EXCELLENCE and ACHIEVEMENT ARE the keywords.

The USA Karate Federation Hall of Fame began with the efforts of the AAU Karate Committee (which was to become the USAKF) to identify those special people who made outstanding contributons to the progress of karate in the United States of America. Those persons selected were given an annual award. At that time the awards were called—Distinguished Service Award, or, in actuality, the man or woman of the year and the athlete of the year (the Centurion Award [for athletes]) and the GE Anderson Distinguished Service Award.

From 1976 to 1997, the National Hall of Fame was not formally located, but the roster of the RECIPIENTS and nature of the highly coveted earned honors were studiously maintained.

In 1996 the USAKF declared the USA Karate Federation National Office in Akron, Ohio a Karate Museum and the Official Location of the Hall of Fame. The Hall of Famers were no longer just talked about, there was now a place where their memorabilia and trophies of great significance could be kept. Additionally, a world wide web site was devised to memorialize the individual members of the Hall and to make their accomplishments known, a site where everyone could come to view and study the rich heritage of our arts created by us in this country.



In 2009 with the passing of Hanshi George E. Anderson, the Hall of Fame memorabilia was transferred to the USA National Karate-do Federation. The USA NKF has not moved to institute its Hall of Fame and it is doubtful they would recognize those who contributed so much to the USA Olympic Karate Effort under the USA Karate Federation. The USA Karate Federation convened a special Hall of Fame in the Year 2015 to recognize those who have made the contribution upon which the Olympic Karate movement was established in the United States. In 2019 we continue to recognize coaches, athletes, officials and administrators and in addition, we give the Pioneer of USA Karate to those who were important to the Olympic Karate effort in the USA. The AAU Karate movement began about 1970 and the first AAU National



Hanshi George E. Anderson November 23, 1931 - August 6, 2009

W o r l d - renowned karate grandmaster, George Anderson, passed away suddenly August 6th in Akron, Ohio.

A 10th degree black belt, Hanshi Anderson was a true Renaissance Man. His early education focused



on the classics and music. He became a concert quality violinist. And his life-long hunger for knowledge enabled him to speak in-depth on almost any subject.

Anderson's keen intellect, hard work ethic, ability to inspire others, and generosity enabled him to rise to such heights. He was well read to the very end and had a great passion for life, which he lived to its fullest, traveling and teaching the martial arts throughout the world.

Anderson's martial arts training began in the early 1950's and extended over 50 years. His training moved from the Akron gyms to the early Korean karate movement, as it developed into Taekwondo, and then to traditional Japanese/Okinawan karate. He rose quickly to membership in the elite Trias International Society. He became President of AAU Karate, then founded the USA Karate Federation, for many years the National Governing Body (NGB) for karate in the USA. He next took an active part in the USA NKF, the present NGB for karate. Anderson also made his mark in Police Self Defense and Defensive Tactics. He taught and served as a defensive tactics advisor to many law enforcement departments around the country.

Anderson was also extremely successful at the world karate level. He was elected president of the Pan Amer-

ican Union of Karate Organizations, chairman of the powerful World Union of Karate-do Organizations (WUKO) Referee Council, and later WUKO's first Vice President. As head of the World Referee Council, he organized the WUKO/WKF's first technical congress, where the international rules for Karate were rewritten and categorized. He was also instrumental in getting karate included in the Pan Am Games.

Hanshi Anderson also founded the US Jujitsu Federation and was the North American representative for the Jujitsu International Federation (JJIF). And as a member of the US Olympic Committee (USOC) board of directors, he represented a variety of sports to the USOC.

His most recent projects included formulating and heading the US Masters Caucus for the USA NKF and spearheading the creation of the combined USA Karate and USA NKF Hall of Fame.

Among his many friends, students, and confidants were such martial arts luminaries as Robert Trias, Sadaki Nakabayash, Fusigero Takagi, Masafumi Suzuki, Phil Koeppel, Jim Mather, Masaharu Sakimukai, Don Madden, Ki Wang Kim, Byung Jick Rho, Richard Chun, Henry Cho, Kang Rhee, Kim Soo Jin, Jhoon Rhee, Mon Soo Park, Chong Lee, and Park Chul Hee. He has also been the mentor of a number of great martial artists including Patrick Hickey, Tom LaPuppet, Robert Saal, John Nanay, Ben Deleon, Carl Wilcox and Larry Overholt and Patty and Walter O'Neill, just to name a few.

He left a great legacy through his Kwanmukan style and his Shihan and Sensei students, who now carry on his tradition. Many of those who received rank underneath Hanshi Anderson run or represent major martial arts organizations today. Through them, his influence will continue for many years to come.

Hanshi Anderson made his home in Akron, Ohio, and lived with Joan, his wife of 59 years. He is survived by five children and many grand and great grandchildren as well as cousins, nephews and nieces.





What is an NGB? A National Governing Body (NGB) is an organization that governs and administers a sport on a national basis. In the United States there are a total of 47 NGBs. In regard to karate, there have been a number of different formations of the NGB under the umbrella of the United States Olympic Committee.

How did USA Karate Federation form and become the most formidable NGB? Well, it all goes back to the AAU Karate program which morphed from being a simple karate committee of the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) to an incorporated sports committee of the AAU (National AAU Karate Committee, Inc.). That was the first major step in getting karate recognized on a national level. The initial Chairman was Jerry Thompson of New Jersey, he was the chairman of the AAU Karate program. He

was later replaced by the late George E. Anderson, who became chairman and president of the USAKF.

United States Olympic Committee required changes in the operation of the AAU NGB status and that was when the USA Karate Federation was born.

Anderson along with his team of the late Thomas LaPuppet and Patrick Hickey, current president of the USAKF, were the architects of the Olympic karate effort. An extensive network of renowned karate instructors throughout the country were sought after to help make the vision of Olympic karate a reality. A number of Japanese instructors were very instrumental in those early years. Takiyuki Mikami, Hidy Ochia, Kiyoshi Yamazaki, Minobu Miki, Koji Sugimoto, Masaharu Sakimukai, Katsutaka Tanaka and others gladly assisted the USAKF.

American instructors who were instrumental were Don Madden, Phil Koeppel, Jim Cottrell, John Nanay, John Townsley, Kim Mather, Robert Saal, Al Santucci, Bernie Scarda, Babe Sorrento, Alex Sternberg, Chuck Merriman, Walter J. O'Neill, Jr., Ridgely Abele, Bill Viola, Roger Jarrett and many others.

Prominent athletes of the USA Karate Federation were Tokey Hill, the first American World Champion. Billy Blanks, Patty Booth-O'Neill, Ken Ferguson, Alberto Pena, Domingo Llanos, Kathy and Cleveland Baxter, Gwen Hoffman, Gina Halderman, John Linebarger, John DiPasqual, Bob Allen, Davy Crocket, Walter J. O'Neill, Jr., Joe Minney, Eddie Bethea, Tracey Day, Julio Martinez, Michael Graves, Jerry Kattawar, David Ames, Jimmy Bland, Cedric Barksdale and Gary Tetsui, just to name a few!

A few of the younger competitors from those early years now hold important roles within the new NGB. Bob Allen, Tommy Hood, Dustin Baldis, Matthew Ralph, John Fonseca, Chris Stratis,

Christina Muccinni, and this list goes on.

USA Karate Federation quickly grew into a massive national program holding state qualifiers, regional championships, Junior Olympic Championships, and the national karate championships where the champions were presented the coveted All-American Award.

During their prime USA Karate had athletes; juniors and adults, every month competing outside the country representing the United States of America. It was a well-oiled machine, with the right people in the correct position, expanding karate nationally and internationally.

The USA Karate Federation is credited with creating the first Pan American Karate Organization, "Pan American Union of Karate-do Organization" or better known as PUKO. Anderson was elected as the very first president. Under the leadership of Anderson, Hickey, LaPuppet and Madden, Team USA was the first official Pan American Karate Champions.

Anderson is also credited with getting karate a spot within the Pan American Sports Organization Games, the very first step in Olympic recognition. The World Union of Karate-do Organization, WKUO, was the world governing body for sport karate and they quickly realized how influential and skilled Anderson was, and he was elected chairman of the powerful referee committee of the WUKO, which is now known as the World Karate Federation (WKF). Within a few years, Anderson was elected First Vice President of the WUKO and was instrumental in creating the medical committee and the tournament administration committee with the assistance of LaPuppet and Michael Bukala.

Back in the United States, the USAKF created the largest qualifying network of karate tournaments in the country. It led the way with professionalizing of competitions by requiring official's certifications, coaches' courses, bye charts, documented registrations, and many other regulations in use by

other major sports groups. Many of those improvements are still being used today with little or no modifications.


As a result of his hard work and dedication to the sport and art of karate, Anderson was the first karate-ka to become a member on the United States Olympic Committee. USA Karate was the first to hold an All-American Youth Championships and the first Junior Olympic Karate Championships.

Many dojo instructors, national karate coaches, officials, state and national administrators along with the very talented and elite athletes from those AAU Karate and USA Karate Federation days carried the mantel and kept the vision of karate as an Olympic sport alive.

Tokyo, Japan summer of 2021 the Olympic Karate dream came true. The United States sent Ariel Torres to compete in men's kata, Sakura Kokumai in women's kata and Brian Irr as the +75kg kumite competitor and Tom Scott in the 75 kg kumite division. Torres won the first ever Olympic medal in karate, taking the bronze in kata for Team USA.





























"Whatever we are ... We are the best there is," said John Hammock, Georgia State Patrol.

Law enforcement is a job that changes and evolves. It also changes those men and women who put on the uniform. The vast majority of police officers are hardworking individuals who truly want to make a positive difference within their community.

There are not many jobs that when called upon see the pain, suffering and misery. Police officers deal with this daily, exposed to that anguish and negativity takes a toll on them and their families. People think that law enforcement officers have to the answer to all their problems when called.

Working in law enforcement can be satisfying, rewarding and in the same breath, it is lonely and sad. Under the current climate of defunding and eliminating police departments, we need to be supportive of the good officers and continue with quality training.

Two of Americas great karate pioneers, Robert A. Traias and George E. Anderson formed the United States Karate Association, an elite organization that has stood the test of time. Within the USKA, a separate organization was formed called the Police Self Defense Institute (PSDI).

The PSDI views Law Enforcement, Military, and other public safety organizations, and Tactical Defensive Education as a positive, necessary, and on-going process of professional development. They embrace teaching as a service in which the officer contributes to the betterment of public safety, and society as a whole. PSDI is committed to assisting public safety professionals develop and maintain strong, consistent, physical and internal standards!

Many senior law enforcement instructors in the United States and abroad received training and certification from the PSDI. Members of the PSDI come from Anti-Terrorists Units, Secret Service, FBI, CID, Interpol, Air Marshals, active police officers, sheriff department. Over the years, the PSDI has had great influence over the methodology of officer survival and self-defense training.

To be a member of the PSDI it is necessary to follow the rules and regulations of the society, which begin with the holding of honor, loyalty, courtesy, and respect as vital personal qualities. After the 911 tragedy, the PSDI has moved to assist security efforts, to provide correct and necessary training for the public and to once again comment on and advise various agencies on sound operational techniques.



















Future Hall of Fame Inductees?





Thank you to the Long Branch High School Air Force Junior ROTC (AFJROTC) program for presenting the colors for the 2022 USA Karate Hall of Fame and the 2022 USA Unified Martial Arts Hall of Fame.

Master Sergeant Wilson is the chief instructor for the Long Branch High School Air Force Junior ROTC program. Here is a brief history.

The mission of AFJROTC is to "Develop citizens of character dedicated to serving their nation and community." Our goal is for every student to succeed academically (in all classes), display personal responsibility which reflects credit upon themselves and the Air Force at all times, and develop a sense of pride and accomplishment in themselves, our school, and AFJROTC. This

is not a military recruitment class and there is never a military service obligation for JROTC participation. Course subject matter will include leadership (to include drill & ceremonies), Aviation History, the Science of Flight, Global Cultures, and physical training. Classes may have guest speakers and/or go on field trips related to the subject material.

Additionally, all cadets will be issued and required to wear the Air Force JROTC uniform one day each week. A complete uniform will be loaned to each cadet at no cost, but it is the student's responsibility to take care of the uniform and return it in good, clean condition at the end of the year. Wear of the AFJROTC uniform is an important part of the class, and will factor into their grade. The cadets will learn how to wear and maintain their uniform according to AFJROTC guidelines, (including appropriate haircut/hairstyle). Failure to wear the uniform on assigned days and maintain appearance standards may result in removal from the class or a zero grade for that day.

Later trained under Sensei Brian Frost, and with Koeikan Founder, Kancho Sensei Eizo Onishi, to a lesser degree. Competed for 22 years in State, National, and International Tournaments, winning Gold Medals in South America and Europe, in addition to the USA. Shay accepted the challenges and forged his own unique and distinguished path in the martial arts. He earned rank in several different disciplines. He excelled in all aspects of competition from karate, weapons to kumite. Shay is a multi-year winner of the Junior Olympics, New Jersey State Karate Championships, USAKF Regional Championships, National Championships and an All-American. He was a member of both the USA Karate Federation and the USA National Karate-do Federation's National Teams. He was selected to train at the US Olympic Training Center and competed several times winning gold for Team USA. One of his greatest strengths is his eidetic memory. He has the ability to recall with high precision, complex kata movements, weapons kata and history of the martial arts. He is also a natural linguist, and was proficient in Japanese, Spanish and Italian. He currently holds the rank of 3rd degree black belt.

Leon Pate

Patty Booth-O'Neill

Patty Booth-O'Neill is being inducted into the USA Karate Federation Hall of Fame in the category of Pioneer of USA Karate. "The finest competitive fighter the USA has produced," is how the late George E. Anderson described Patricia Booth-O'Neill during a 1994 interview. She first made karate history back in 1982 when the AAU Karate Program held the first ever trails for a women's kumite team. Booth-O'Neill took first place in those fighting trails when women entered the ring without any weight class or years of experience. On a side note, it was in 1981 that American women were able to participate in kata competition. On a national level, Booth-O'Neill never lost a single match from 1982 through 1987 when she retired from competition. Just a tad over five feet tall and weighing only 112-pounds, she was tiny in the open weight division. "She made up for her lack of size by her bull-headed aggressiveness,"

said Anderson. Booth-O'Neill was one of the first American woman to medal at the World Championships, taking the bronze at the 1984 WUKO World Cup in Hungry. She is a 7-time National Champion with those five years of never losing a match and a 7-time All-American. She also won gold at the World Games. "I never trained to be a real competitive person. I just trained to better my own personal technique. I did not desire to get fancy," said Booth-O'Neill. She added that it seems some fighters concentrate on mimicking the techniques of those whom they admire. "For me, I just trained, focused on getting my technique the fastest so that no matter what technique my opponent had, I could deliver mine with more speed and timing. I wanted to beat an opponent with my own technique and style." 1987 Booth-O'Neill was named the USA Karate Federation Female Athlete of the Year. 2015 Booth-O'Neill was inducted into the USA Karate Hall of Fame as an Athlete and Coach.

Frank Bouchonville

Frank Bouchonville is being inducted into the USA Karate Federation Hall of Fame in the category of Pioneer of USA Karate. Frank Bouchonville began his martial arts training in 1973. He currently holds a 6th Dan in Shito-Ryu Karate, and a 2nd Dan in Aikikai Aikido. Frank is employed by Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital as a Security officer and Defensive Tactics Instructor to security staff. In 2019, Frank was inducted into the USA Karate Hall of Fame as a National Athlete.

Pat Byrnes

"Pat Byrnes is being inducted into the USA Karate Federation Hall of Fame in the category of Pioneer of USA Karate. Patrick Byrnes October 15, 1936-May 2, 2020 Sensei Byrnes began his martial arts training in 1954 in Judo under Takahiko Ishikawa where he earned his black belt. In 1960 he was introduced to the legendary Shotokan instructor Teruyuki Okazaki where he trained under him for 10 years and after operated a school for Sensei Okazaki is Trenton, NJ. While at the Okazaki dojo Sensei Byrnes had the opportunity to train under Katsuya Kisaka, a former All-Japan Karate Champion. Kisaka's aggressive fighting style meshed perfectly with Sensei Byrnes and eventually came to be "The Bushi Way." In 1970 Sensei left Okazaki's organization and started his own dojo called Bushido. In 1984 Bushido made its first foray into the National level competition with the USAKF. He became great friends with the late Hanshi George Anderson who had promoted Sensei several times over the years eventually to an 8th Degree black belt. From 1984 to 2013 Bushido had at least one representative on the National Team and they remain active in competitions to this day. The Bushi competitors have won thousands of medals and dozens of National Championships in that time as well as several World Championship medals. He was a great mentor to many students and instructors alike. He believed that the ultimate aim of karate was to "seek perfection of character". He will be remembered and missed by all that knew him."

James Del Garbino

James Del Garbino is being inducted into the USA Karate Federation Hall of Fame in the category of Pioneer of USA Karate. James T. Del Garbino, 9th Dan Kwanmukan, Hanshi, 8th Dan Shotokan, 6th Dan, United States Ju-Jitsu Federation, 6th Dan Taekwondo, 5th Dan Kobudo, 3rd Dan, Judo, 2nd Dan Seito Shito Ryu, 2nd Dan Tai Chi. Jim would like to recognize the impact that his teachers continue to have on his life in Budo and personal life. He thanks Joseph Bonacci, Joseph Gabriel, George Anderson and Patrick Hickey for their guidance and friendship. Jim was the Regional Supervising Officer of New England USAKF from 1989 to 2000. He earned his National Kumite Referee license in 1995 and was also National and/or Atlantic League Champion for Kata and Kobudo in 1995, 1998 and 2000. Jim was awarded Most Outstanding Athlete in 1995 by the USAKF. Jim coached 9 of his students to be National

Champions in the disciplines of Kata, Kumite and Ju-Jitsu. Jim continues to train and teach at Clark University (since 1989) and Worcester Polytechnic Institute. Today, Jim is co-owner of Giacomo's Gourmet Foods and is an award-winning Chef.

Dr. Gina Formica, PT, DPT

Dr. Gina Formica, PT, DPT is being inducted into the USA Karate Federation Hall of Fame in the category of Pioneer of USA Karate. Dr. Formica trained under the late Patrick Byrnes at Bushido Karate in Lansdale Pennsylvania from 1981-1990 earning her 2nd Dan in Shotokan Karate. She received All-American awards from 1983-1988. She competed in 3 WUKO championships-Maastricht Holland in 1984, Sydney Australia in 1986 and Cairo Egypt in 1988 where she earned a 3rd Place Bronze medal in Kumite in the 63-kilo weight division. She also competed in the Women's world Championships in Taipei in 1985, and the Mexican-American- games in Mexico City in 1987 placing first in Kumite 63k weight division.

Tokey Hill

Tokey Hill is being inducted into the USA Karate Federation Hall of Fame in the category of Pioneer of USA Karate. Tokey Hill - Athletic career was the beginning of an almost 50-year career in USA Karate. In 1978 Tokey Hill won the All-Japan Championships in Yokohama Japan. His career highlight is for winning a gold medal in Madrid, Spain at the WUKO World Championships. In addition, he also won gold at the Pan American Championships, and a bronze medal at the 1981 World Games. He was the recipient of the "Outstanding Technician Award" at the International of France in Paris. His coaching career was solidified in the 1990's and was significant in bringing modern training methods to the USA National Team. This was instrumental in the USA Team breaking a record in the Pan Am Games in Winnipeg in 1999; winning 5 Gold, 1 Silver, and 3 Bronze. From that performance, he was awarded USOC Coach of the Year award for Karate. He was the Head Coach from 1992-2002 and again 2008 - 2015. He was the Head Coach at the 1995, 1999, 2007, 2011, 2015 Pan Am Games. He served as a board member for USA Karate from 2008-2021. He currently serves on the technical committee of the PKF and WKF (2021). His career has been largely devoted to the success of the United States National Karate Team and the Karate's Olympic Movement from 1976-2021.

Mickey Major

Chimene Montivero-Cole
